The hardest part about being so invested in the wellbeing of these animals is to know that cats are being abandoned—whether left behind when

owners move, or being dropped off at a country lane. Sadly, there are also other ways that cats and other animals are abandoned that are equally, if not more, worrisome.

This is where CAT comes into play. Since CAT started its Trap/Neuter/Release program, the incidence of disease has decreased, cats are not fighting so much, and the generosity of caretakers help make sure that the cats are fed and healthy.

Trey's Diabetic Journey

Trey joined Kathleen Williams' family in 2003 as an abandoned, skinny little fellow. His new mother made sure the bowl was never empty, and soon Trey couldn't walk pass the dish without stopping for a snack. Soon enough, he was a fat, happy boy, weighing almost 18 lbs.

Unfortunately, he was not a happy cat at all. Trey was a very sick cat. In May 2010, it was discovered that he was diabetic.



Kathleen was devastated; she though Trey was dying. Her vet suggested she go online and check out FDMB (Feline Diabetic Message

Board) for information. Kathleen is a reader, and this message board had so much

great information...she read, and read, and asked question after question. She jokes that she could write a book with all the questions she asked!

When diet changes alone couldn't lower Trey's blood sugar, Trey was put on insulin. FDMB stayed online with Kathleen until 3am a few times as they were learning the ropes!

The funny thing is, Kathleen used to be so scared of needles—but home blood sugar testing is a must. A couple of deep breaths for momma and a couple of treats for the good kitty is the way to make the entire event positive. Now, once a week, Trey jumps up on his blanket on the corner of the table, where they always do the testing, and stares at Kathleen to say, "... isn't there something you are supposed to be doing...right now?"



Trey's diabetic equipment: blood sugar meter, sock with warm beans for bringing the blood into the vein, and lancet.

Cats are amazing animals and with the right help can go into remission. Trey was only on insulin for 2 months the first time. He was discovered to be diabetic again in 2014. This time, they had to endure 8 months of insulin and lots of pokes to the ear, but he entered remission again. However, he was getting older, and 16 months later, he was started on insulin again in February 2016. On insulin or not, diabetic cats can live a long, healthy life with a conscientious caregiver.

... by cat owners & caregivers



Used kitty litter (along with feces) goes into the **COMPOST CART**. The only exception to this is kitty litter made from silicone which would be disposed of in the **WASTE CART**.

Notes:

- soiled newsprint used to line litter boxes also goes into COMPOST;
- if using plastic liners, dispose of dirty liners in WASTE.
