Special Features Keeping our cats safe

Ever wonder what plants out there are unsafe for cats? Ashley Balderston, Veseys Seeds & Bulbs horticulturist, answered just that question for CAT: In PEI, plants that are poisonous for cats include: a) Daffodils. The flowers contain an alkaloid called Lycrone. This can cause diarrhea as well as heart and respiratory issues. b) Tomatoes and potatoes: the stems, leaves, and green fruit are deadly. c) All parts of rhododendrons and azaleas. d) Poppies, gladiolas, lilies, and morning glories can irritate the mouth, upset the stomach, and



even cause liver failure.

Beautiful spring daffodils are poisonous to cats.

If you have these plants in your yard, consider using scent to keep the cats away; davidsuzuki.org gives the following tips: rue, lavender, pennyroyal, and lemon thyme



planted throughout the garden may deter cats from the garden. Cats also dislike strong citrus scents—so orange and lemon peels placed around the plants make a natural compost and cat deterrent. Also, a spray made of 1 tsp black pepper, dry mustard, and cinnamon, a few drops of citrus essential oil, and a crushed garlic clove in a spray bottle along with enough water to fill the bottle is excellent for keeping cats out of garden beds.

Feral Cats and Birds

Dr Peter Foley, a veterinarian with the Atlantic Veterinary College, says that spaying and neutering isn't just the right thing to do for the cat population, it may be good for the wildlife population as well.

While free-roaming cats are known for helpfully catching nuisance rodents, we would want to be careful around a nesting area for piping plovers, for example.

So how does the Trap-Neuter-Release program make a difference? Dr Foley says he doesn't know the full numbers, but what he's seen has given him hope. The number of cats surrendered to the PEI Humane Society's shelter has steadily decreased since the TNR program began in



2001. As well, the Humane Society spays and neuters cats before they are adopted, while there is also support for those with limited financial means

who want to spay/neuter their feline friends.

With this work, we are helping both free-roaming cats live happier and healthier lives AND bird populations.

As a review from last year, because cold winter will be here sooner than we realize: Caring for Cats in Winter

- Provide shelters to keep cats safe, warm, and dry (check out www.neighborhoodcats.org/ HOW_TO_FERAL_CAT_WINTER_SH ELTER for ideas)
- Avoid chemical ice melt/salt products
- Watch for anti-freeze leaks or spills, know the signs of poisoning and act fast!
- Knock the bonnet of your car before starting the engine
